It's an open, airy space that houses the bakery (producing bread two or three times a day), the restaurant (sit-down for dinner, order-at-the-counter for breakfast and lunch), the coffee manufactory and, yet to come, an ice cream shop. The exhibition will be the first to examine the height of the millinery trade in Paris, from around 1875 to 1914, as reflected in the work of the Impressionists.
