The book for November is <u>Demon Copperhead</u> by Barbara Kingsolver. "Like Dickens, Kingsolver generates momentum by galloping the reader through escapades that accumulate to advance a larger question — in this case, about how an artist's consciousness is formed" (Molly Young, New York Times). The novel provides "her best demonstration yet of a novel's ability to simultaneously entertain and move and plead for reform" (Ron Charles, Washington Post).

The book for December is <u>Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI</u> by David Grann. "Grann has proved himself a master of spinning delicious, many-layered mysteries that also happen to be true... It will sear your soul" (Dave Eggers, New York Times). "A twisting, haunting true-life murder mystery about one of the most monstrous crimes in American history..." (Amazon).
